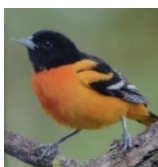

**LOONEY TUNES: MALE LOON YODEL COMMUNICATIONS**, Tuesday, Feb. 1, 7:30pm. Jay Mager, ONU Assistant Professor, Dept. of Biological and Allied Health Sciences, will discuss aspects of his research in North- Central Wisconsin focusing on the specifics of how male loons acquire territories and defend them. You can learn much about a male loon from his tune! Male loons communicate information about their fighting abilities and motivation to escalate a contest through an acoustic signal called a yodel. Geared to the nature enthusiast, do not miss the highlights of Dr. Mager's Wisconsin research.

**14TH ANNUAL GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT (GBBC)**, Friday through Monday, February 18-21. GBBC is a joint project of the National Audubon Society, Cornell Laboratory of Ornithology, and Bird Studies Canada for the amateur observer. Participation in the GBBC is free, educational, easy, and best of all, FUN! This online citizens-science census counts birds anywhere at any time during the scheduled weekend. Data is sent via the Internet. All ages and skill levels are welcome. Help scientists define the status of winter birds. **FALL BIRDSEED SALE RESULTS.** Co-chair Anne Smedley reports that the November sale raised \$1,899.41 (including \$478.60 in donations). TMAS thanks those who purchased seed, DeHaven Home and Garden Showplace for providing both Findlay and Lima store locations for the sale and for all the other great backup support, and Northland Quick Print for printing the sale fliers. **AUDUBON ADVENTURES 2010 – 2011.** Audubon Adventures (AA), a National Audubon Society program, publishes educational materials for students in grades 3-6. Full-color resources include a classroom manual for the teacher and unit newspapers for each student. This year's edition is titled "Wildlife on the Move," an exploration of migrating animals. It profiles the amazing journeys and life cycles of different birds, insects, and sea creatures. The Action for Planet Earth component focuses on improving habitat for migratory wildlife. AA integrates reading with science and other core disciplines and meets science and language arts standards. TMAS has supported the AA program since its inception in 1984 and is reaching out to 77 classrooms this year.

Thanks to the following for their contributions in support of this outstanding program: Benjamin Logan Local School District, Logan County; Celina City School District, Mercer County; and the Walter James "Jim" Wright Memorial Fund in support of Allen County classrooms. Participating school districts are listed by county --ALLEN: Bluffton EVSD (3 grade 3 classrooms); Elida LSD (4 grade 4 classrooms, all grade 5 students, 4 grade 6 classrooms); Lima CSD (Lima South MS - grade 5-8 science magnet students); St. Girard School, Lima (grade 3-6 students); St. Rose School, Lima (5-8 grade students); Perry LSD (3 grade 4 classrooms); Pilgrim Christian School, Lima (4-6 grade students); Shawnee LSD (3-4 grade students) -- AUGLAIZE: Wapakoneta CSD (3 grade 4 classrooms) -- LOGAN: Benjamin Logan LSD (grade 4 students) -- MERCER: Celina CSD (grade 4 students at Celina East ES, 2 grade 5 classrooms & all grade 6 students at Celina IS); Immaculate Conception School, Celina (grade 4 students). In addition, there are three Special Education teachers using AA in their upper grade classrooms, one in the Ada EVSD in HARDIN County and two in the St. Marys CSD in AUGLAIZE County.

## YOUR ANNUAL APPEAL DONATION IN ACTION -- HABITAT RESTORATION AT CAMP MYEERAH

In the summer of 2009 Tri-Moraine, given the go-ahead by the Girl Scouts of Western Ohio, initiated a long-range program to improve the quality of the wildlife habitat at Camp Myeerah (CM) in Logan County. An Important Bird Area (IBA), CM is one of six IBAs in the chapter's 8-county service area and the site of its annual Environmental Education Weekend. TMAS nominated CM for IBA status.

Invasive species including autumn olive, bush honeysuckles, and multiflora rose are rampant. Chapter members toured the property with conservation specialists and Girl Scout personnel to evaluate both the problems and the solutions. The scope of the problem was vast and the decision was made to investigate the availability of partnerships and grants. The result was a coalition of the Girl Scouts, Tri-Moraine, the US Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS), the Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS), and Pheasants Forever of Logan County and a combined pot of cash and in-kind service. At the chapter's November program meeting, USFWS's Donnie Knight and NRCS's Mike Retterer gave a graphic presentation of progress to date. Approximately 80 acres have been cleared for the restoration of grasslands (oak savannah and prairie). In the spring the land will be prepared for seeding and various grasses and *forbs* (flowering plants other than grasses) will be planted. **And that's where your chapter's \$5,000 pledge gets put to work!**
